

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

<u>WINTER VOLUNTEERS NEEDED</u> - Now that winter has arrived, we're looking for a few volunteers to help keep our church entrances safe and welcoming. If you attend either weekend or weekday Masses, please consider coming a little early to help shovel the snow & spread salt to clear the walkway. Even a few minutes of teamwork before Mass can make a big differ-



ence for our parish family. Thank you for helping keep St. Mary's safe for everyone this winter! WORLD DAY OF THE POOR (Today, November 16) - In 2017, Pope Francis instituted The World Day of the Poor to encourage the Church to actively address poverty in its various forms. It is time for Christians and all men and women of goodwill to reflect and take action, encouraging people to connect with those experiencing poverty and work towards ending cycles of poverty. For this year 2025, Pope Leo XIV issues a message centered on the theme: "You are my hope", and expresses his hope that this Jubilee Year may encourage the development of policies aimed at combatting forms of poverty both old and new. "Poverty has structural causes that must be addressed and eliminated," he writes, calling for policies that reflect the Church's commitment to labour, education, housing and healthcare as universal rights. "The poor are not a distraction for the Church," he reiterates, "They are our beloved brothers and sisters... they put us in contact with the truth of the Gospel." In 2025, it is estimated that approximately 808 million people will be living in extreme poverty, which represents 9.9% of the global population. Another estimate suggests that around 838 million individuals are living below the international poverty line of \$3 per person per day (globalclimatereview.org).

PALLIATIVE CARE VS. MAiD - (From Vatican) "The Vatican has consistently condemned euthanasia and assisted suicide, emphasizing the moral obligation to provide care and support for those in the terminal stages of life. The church teaches that life is a sacred and inviolable gift, and medical assistance in dying is a violation of this principle." (From Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, CCCC) "Our position remains unequivocal. Euthanasia and assisted suicide constitute the deliberate killing of human life in violation of God's Commandments; they erode our shared dignity by failing to see, to accept, and accompany those suffering and dying. Furthermore, they undermine the fundamental duty we have to take care of the weakest and most vulnerable members of society. Human life must be protected from conception to natural death, at all stages and in all conditions." The church advocates for palliative care which is seen as a concrete sign of solidarity with the suffering and dying. The church's stance is based on the belief that life is a right, not death, and that medical assistance in dying is a crime against human life.

<u>PRIEST SITS DOWN AFTER HOMILY</u> - The priest sitting down after the homily is a practice that had been observed for centuries and is rooted in tradition and biblical meaning. This moment of silence allows the congregation to digest the homily's content and fosters a contemplative atmosphere, enriching the worship experience by allowing time for internali-

zation of the gospel message. Furthermore, such moments of silence in the liturgy enhances faithful spiritual experience of the Mass.
