THE IMPORTANCE OF JOHN THE BAPTIST'S CALL - His mission was not simply to call people to repentance - it was to prepare Israel to recognize and receive the Messiah. His call to believe in Jesus had profound theological, spiritual, and historical consequences that shaped the entire unfolding



of salvation history. When John the Baptist appears in the Gospels, he announces a message that echoes the prophecy of Isaiah: "A voice cries out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make His paths straight." This is not just poetry. It carries deep spiritual meaning for every believer — including us today. In ancient times, before a king traveled, workers would go ahead to: clear stones, fill in holes, straighten crooked paths. John uses the same image for our souls. To "prepare the way of the Lord" means to cleanse our hearts, straighten our lives, and awaken our souls so that Jesus Christ can enter, reign, and transform us.

COUNCIL OF NICEA'S IMPACT ON THE CHURCH - The first Ecumenical Council in the histo-

ry of the Church took place in 325. After some two hundred fifty years of persecution, the decision of the Emperor Constantine to legalize Christianity allowed Christians to worship in freedom throughout the Roman Empire. But the freedom for the Church was not without controversy. An Alexandrian priest, Arius, provoked a firestorm when he challenged the true divinity of Jesus Christ. For Arius, Jesus was not fully God, but merely a creature—albeit a creature exalted to a position next to God the Father and above all others. The doctrinal controversy soon swept throughout Christianity, threatening to divide the Church. In response, Constantine called together a universal synod, inviting all the bishops throughout the world. They gathered in the city of Nicaea, to determine definitively the faith of the Church. After heated discussions, the bishops numbering 318—composed a Creed, a written statement of the Christian faith. The formula, "We believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made; of one Being with the Father" definitively rejected the teachings of Arius. The Council of Nicaea is recognized as authoritative by all Christian Churches and communities, and the Creed proclaimed by the Council, is recited by Christians around the world.

POPE'S PRAYER INTENTION FOR DECEMBER (For Christians in areas of conflict) "Let us pray that Christians living in areas of war or conflict, especially in the Middle East, might be seeds of peace, reconciliation, and hope."

FIRST RECONCILIATION - We offer our sincere congratulations to the children of St. Mary's School as they prepare for their First Reconciliation on December 12, 2025. May the grace of this sacrament fill them with peace and guide them ever closer to Christ. We ask our parish community to pray for them and their families during this blessed time.

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY (December 8) The Immaculate

Conception, according to the teaching of the Catholic Church, was the conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the womb of her mother, St Anne. Mary was conceived naturally but God kept her soul *immaculate*, i.e. free from original sin. The official confirmation of the dogma was defined in 1854 by Pope Pius IX, although the belief that Mary was sinless and conceived free from sin is very old. Catholics give importance to this feast because it celebrates the unique grace bestowed upon Mary, the mother of Jesus. This grace was necessary for



her to be a sinless mother of God. This feast is a time for us to honor Mary's holiness and encourage all to strive for a life of holiness and obedience to God's plan.

ADVENT WREATH MEANING - The Advent wreath is one of the most symbolic traditions for the season of Advent. With candles lit on each of the four weeks of Advent, the wreath is a re-

minder of the hope and joy coming. CANDLES: They symbolize hope, peace, joy and love, reflecting the spiritual journey of preparation for the coming of Christ during the Advent season. The color purple reflecting a time of waiting and anticipation. The color rose signifies joy, celebrating the nearing of Christ's birth. The white candle in the center of the wreath represents the light of Christ. The lighting of the candles symbolizes the gradual arrival of light into the world representing Christ as the light of the world who dispels darkness and sin. CIRCULAR SHAPE: The circular shape of the wreath represents the eternal nature of



God—His never-ending love, mercy, and faithfulness. It also symbolizes the unending cycle of seasons and the continuous nature of time. <u>EVERGREEN BRANCHES</u>: which do not lose their leaves in winter, represent the everlasting life found in Christ. They are a symbol of hope and renewal, pointing to the promise of eternal life through Jesus.
